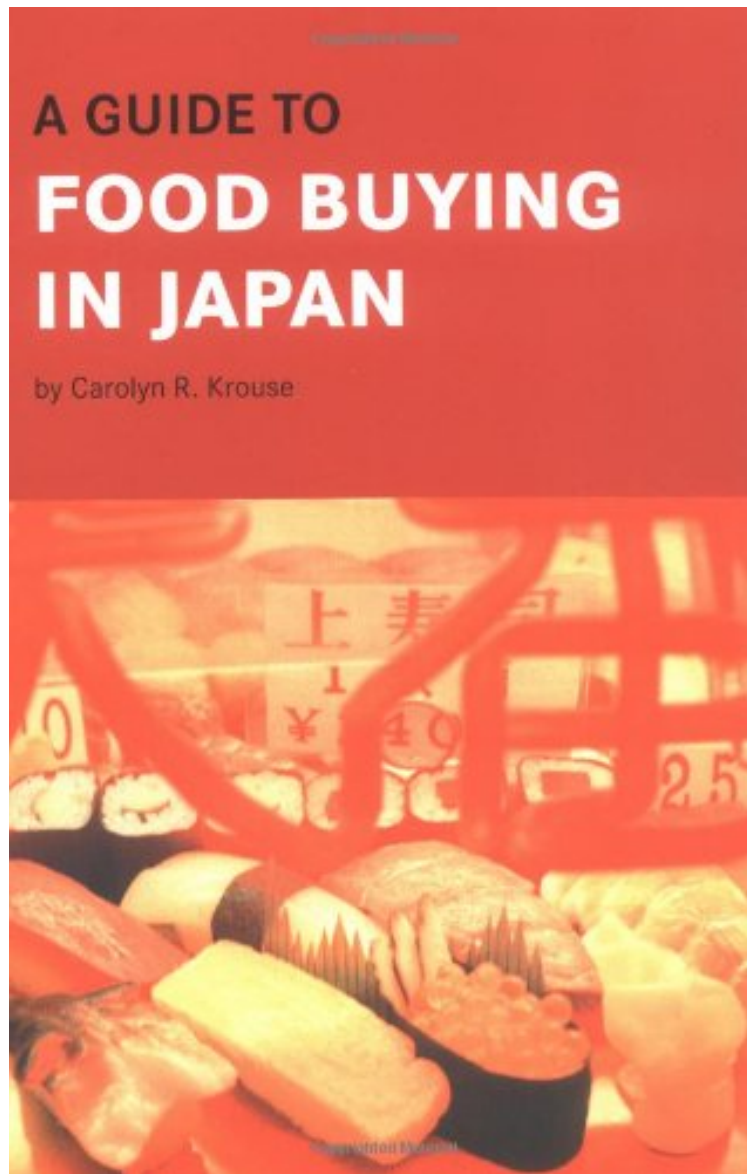

The items are listed out clearly along with pictures to help identify the products. The book includes four appendixes: Counting in Japanese, Weights and Measures (converting standard and metric), Terms used in Cooking (Japanese Character and Romanized — English translations), Recipes and Cooking Tips all designed for the American cook to use while in Japan.
