ThompsonLet me start by saying that this is NOT a suitable book for either novices looking to learn something about Chinese cooking, or for for more advanced cooks wanting to expand their repertoire of Chinese dishes. This book is over a half century old, having been published in 1958, and its focus is very much on Chinese food as it was interpreted in America during that era. As such, this is a book that will mostly only interest those with a deep interest in the history of this cuisine or, more broadly,the study of Chinese-American Culture. Although many of the dishes are not what most sophisticated foodies would regard as 'authentic' Chinese today (relying heavily on easily available American ingredients like Worcester sauce and ketchup), the book stands apart from many from the same time period in that it presents quite a few recipes that would be very unfamiliar (and thus even more exotic) to contemporary non-Chinese readers. This is a book that, despite the often idiosyncratic and difficult transliterations, I am very glad to have in my collection.
